INTRODUCTION

The Oregon Government Ethics Commission has jurisdiction over elected and appointed executive branch officials, executive branch employees, and members of the legislature. [Or. Rev. Stat. §§ 244.010, 244.020\(15\)](#).

SCOPE OF SANCTIONS

Personnel Actions – The Commission has the authority to remove an appointed public official for violation of the ethics rules or issue a letter of reprimand, explanation, or education to any public official. [Or. Rev. Stat. § 244.270\(1\), \(2\); 350\(5\)](#).

Injunctions – NONE

Fines – It may impose civil penalties, including fines ranging up to \$25,000 and twice the amount of the improper benefit. [Or. Rev. Stat. §§ 244.350, 244.360](#).

ENFORCEMENT ACTIONS for 2016, 2017, and 2018, if available

1. How many complaints were filed?

2016 – 40 complaints were filed. Of these 40, 5 related to failure to file statements of economic interest.¹

2017 – 56 complaints were filed.²

2018 – 115 complaints were filed.³

2. How many complaints were dismissed?

2016 – 19 complaints were dismissed. Of these, one related to failure to file statements of economic interest.⁴

2017 – 20 complaints were dismissed.⁵

2018 – 31 complaints were dismissed.⁶

3. How many cases were resolved with a finding of no ethics violation?

2016 – This information cannot be determined.

2017 – 16 cases were resolved with a finding of no ethics violation. Of these, 2 related to failure to file statements of economic interest.⁷

2018 – 28 cases were resolved with a finding of no ethics violation. Of these, 8 related to failure to file statements of economic interest.⁸

4. How many cases were resolved with a finding of an ethics violation?

2016 – This information cannot be determined.

2017 – 14 cases were resolved with a finding of an ethics violation. Of these, 5 related to failure to file statements of economic interest.⁹

2018 – 21 cases were resolved with a finding of an ethics violation. Of these, 8 related to failure to file statements of economic interest.¹⁰

5. What sanction was adopted?

2016 – This information cannot be determined.

2017 – A variety of sanctions were adopted including letters of education and fines ranging from \$100 – \$750.¹¹

2018 – A variety of sanctions were adopted including letters of education and fines ranging from \$250 – \$20,000.¹²

ARE THE DECISIONS PUBLICLY AVAILABLE?

Partially – the decisions for 2017 and 2018 are published on the Commission’s website, but cases from 2016 are not available.¹³
